Scout troops leave a mark in Mahikeng

MORE than 80 scout troops from the United Kingdom, Swaziland and North West recently gathered for the annual South African Scouts Expedition (Sase) that ended with the launch of a rover crew at the North West University (NWU) Mafikeng campus.

Sase seeks to promote scouting and teach life skills to help youth develop both their moral compass as upcoming citizens in their respective communities and educate them on the importance of respecting one's environment.

University communications officer Phenyo Mokgothu said spending a day with the scouts gave young people an understanding on the meaning of dis-

Prof Mashudu Maselesele and other high-profile people in Mahikeng, like Barolong Bo Ratshidi paramount chief Jeffrey Montshioa.

Addressing the scouts, Chief Montshioa said: "We are happy to see you in our town and let me tell you that scouts played a role during the Anglo-Boer War which resulted in the British victory and the famous siege of Mahikeng. In a way, the develop-ment helped in the preservation of the Barolong Bo Ratshidi nation's culture.

He added that scouting taught young people to follow the positive values of society.
